
















Marx believed with each cycle of "prosperity and then depression" more and more people would be pushed down into the proletariat. Final collapse of capitalism: As more and more people were pushed into the lower class the class would gain in power.











One explanation: rather than capitalism creating a large lower class, a large middle-class emerged. The wealthy gave up some of their profit to the middle class to avoid the revolution predicted.
